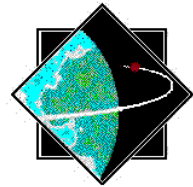

Call for Science Fair Judges

Volunteer judges are needed for student projects at the upcoming regional science fair.
All that is required is your expertise combined with a donation of your time.

The **Frontenac Lennox and Addington Science Fair (FLASF)** is the regional science fair for all schools in the counties of Frontenac and Lennox & Addington. It is one of approximately 100 such regional fairs across Canada. It brings together about 300 students and 225 projects (students may work singly or in pairs). Students compete in Primary (Grades 5-6), Junior (7-8), Intermediate (9-10), and Senior (11-12) categories.

Approximately 160 judges are needed for each of two half-days of judging. Judging will take place on the evening of **Friday April 3** and the morning of **Saturday April 4**. Returning and new judges are welcome. Some projects need to be judged in French and require fluently bilingual judges. Judging categories are: Human Health Science, Life & Earth Science; Physical & Mathematical Science; and Engineering & Computing Science.

The on-site commitment is the equivalent of one full day of judging: Friday evening (3.5 hours) and Saturday morning (3 hours). Judges are encouraged to volunteer for both sessions. A limited number of slots are available for single-session judges. Lunch will be provided on Saturday. Judging guidelines, a sample judging form, and project assignments & descriptions will be provided in advance.
